JONATHAN GREGOIRE (IAA 04-06; IAC 03-05; IAC staff 06-07) completed his junior year at St. John's University in Collegeville, Minnesota as an organ performance major, studying under Dr. Kim R. Kasling. This fall he will study abroad for a semester in Cannes, France. Jonathan has held organ positions at Cross View Lutheran Church in Edina, the St. John's Abbey Church, and St. Mary's Catholic Church of Melrose. This spring, he was awarded the Presser Scholarship for distinguished service within the music department, given to one student each year. Last summer, he premiered *Praise for Organ* and *Steel Drum* by Carol Barnett at the National Convention of the American Guild of Organists in Minneapolis. A CD recording is available with *The Minnesota Organ Book* through Augsburg Fortress. Jonathan performed in the *Pipedreams Live!* concert at Interlochen in 2007. He has had the opportunity to work with many national and international organists including Hans Fagius, Daniel Roth, Olivier Vernet, John Weaver, and Marilyn Keiser. Jonathan is an alum of Interlochen, where he was named salutatorian and received the Young Artist Award in Organ and academic awards in Math and Chemistry upon graduation. During his time at the academy, he also received an honorable mention from the ARTS competition through the National Foundation for Achievement in the Arts, and performed a joint recital at St. Thomas Church Fifth Avenue in New York City. After a summer away Jonathan is glad to be "home".
